Yesterday, about one o'clock, an experiment was made with the new hydraulic machine, constructed from the plane and under the direction of Mr Commafrom the plane and under the direction of Mr Comma-ni, engineer of the draining company, in presence of a numerous assistings of public officers and other per-sons, anxious to wireses the success of an enterprise so important to this city.

This machine consists of a wheel of cast iron, fur-nished with wide wooden paddles, working in a finat-

ing bridge, 5 feet wide by to in length, which receives the water from the draining easale, and raises it to a height varying from two to seven feet, according to the height of the Bayou St John, and throws it into a connected with the canal of the navigation company. The wheel, worked by a steam engine of three herse

power, and performing in a very regular manner moves with a rapidity proportioned to the mass of water which it raises, and is so adjusted that it is fittle retarded, so much does the inclination given to the paddles, favor the throwing out of the water. The great quantity of water thus the .wa out, amounting to about one million of gallons per hour, raised the most pleasing astonishment in the minds of the spectators. pleasing autonisment in the mining of the appetutors. The machine has completely accomplished the object of the engineer. The visible falling of the draining canal, dering the time the experiment lassed, left no doubt as to the result, abould it be worked with activity.
