New Orleans, which, we doubt not, is increasing at less as rapidly as New York. But we have no dead to begin with—mone, we mean, that can be resent upon. We should be very willing to hazard an estimate of its present ameant, and we know of no mode of arriving at it. The last cansus was taken under the act of congress is the year 1830; but we are well assured that it was taken in so loose and irregular a ma that a mere guess might give the real amount more accurately. It was taken in the autumn, when a great portion of our population was absent, and an equal proportion of the dwellings shut up. This was nolet us give 14,000 more on account of omissions. These estimates are more important than they appear to be at first sight.
