

My idea sir—I have the pleasure to communicate to you the intelligence of the discovery of a new island or continent, as it is called, in the Southern Ocean, by the French exploring ship Astrolabe and Zelic. This information was brought here by the English barque Calcutta, from Van Dieman's Land; on board which were some specimens of granite tock, and also a chart of the coast. The land has been called Addile,* and is faid down from the long. 139 deg. 30 m. cast of Paris to 188 deg. 30 m; and latitude 65 deg. to 67 deg, south. It is reported that the land is completely protected by an icy barrier, extending many miles into the sea. As this will no doubt be the first minestin received in the United States, I take much pleasure in conveying it to you.
