With the exception of political news (which is still foggy) and later European intelligence, the papers received by yesterday's mail contain nothing of interest.

**LOUISIANA.**

We hope our whigs there in other states are satisfied with Louisiana. We promised 3,000 majority, and the noble whigs of this state have more than answered our pledge.

If Mr. Van Buren gets New York, Pennsylvania and Virginia—all in the highest degree improbable—he cannot be elected. What do our friends think of that?

**AMERICAN REPUBLIC.**—Mr. Conner, a young tragedian, of whom report speaks favorably, appears this evening. In "Wise and Beautiful play of 'Tartuffe' the Usurper," Mr. Conner casts the part of Angelo. He likewise appears in the farce of the "Weathercock."

We received last night, per steamer *Charterer*, from Nashville a report that Harrison's majority in that State would be 10,000.

**THE ELECTIONS.**

We left our office for the result of the election, as far as from us. The return received by this morning's mail is of the most encouraging character. The tide of revolution is on.

**PENNSYLVANIA.**

From the *Philadelphia National Gazette* of Tuesday afternoon:

Yesterday evening we received additional returns, and most of them from the Northern and Eastern counties. The Van Buren party had not—as was most feared—sufficiently increased their majorities to overtake the great increase of the Whig vote in the West.

These returns from the Western part of the State can be relied on, the Harrison party have undoubtedly swayed their candidate. Subsidiary are the returns for 145 counties, and there are yet 7 counties to be heard from.

Should the remaining counties give the same majorities as on the Congressional vote on the 13th of October last, General Harrison has the State by at least 1,500, and it may reach sixteen or eighteen hundred majority. These seven counties stand thus on the 13th ult.

The above seven counties have the majorities on the last Congressional vote added to the reported majorities which were received last evening. If the vote should be similar, Harrison's majority will be 1,151, but as they are mostly western counties, it is expected that Van Buren's majorities will be reduced, and the vote much increased. We think the state has assuredly cast her electoral vote for General Harrison.—The return by this evening's mail will reduce this to a certainty.

In reference to the 45 counties mentioned above, the *Gazette* says:

"In Louisiana we have given the Van Buren majority to those who were claimed by their own authoritatively."

In the above estimate, the Harrison majority in Erie county is set down at 1,300. A memorandum on a letter received last night states that the Harrison majority—last year CANNON's majority was about 1,500.
