When this is done the sentiment will generally prevait throughout the city, that to the laws is the best and wisest recourse for all girevances.

The Grand Jury find much fault with the present system of treating some jurors, who are li-mentify dealt with, and who, though summoned never appear and never perform duty. They say that the pury duty of this city is performed by comparatively few persons, which makes it so onerous. Were it more generally divided the duty would prove light. They cail for a reform in this respect, and suggest that the fine supposed instead of going to the State should be apprendicted to the character.
