The new Cherokee Treaty was laid before the Senate to-day. The particulars have not transgired in hill, but its understood to be an amicable settlement of all differences between the Eastern and Western Cherokees, and will result in a reconciliation of all those who have been so long alsenated. The argument before the Commissioners (Messre, Arnistrong, Paris and Burke) hardly gave promise of so anicable a conclusion of the controversy. Nor are the parties altogether satisfied, but as the case was submitted in good faith for arbitration, there is no disposition to depart from it. A spirit of compromise appears to have guided the conclusions arrived at. The Senate will have the settlement of some minor questions growing out of the new fresty. About \$17.00 will have to be appropriated at once, to meet the provisions in the Treaty, and ultimately absorb \$1,560,00.3. The Treaty was referred to the Indian Committee to-day.


