Captain D reports that the British mail steamer from Vera Cruz arrived at Havana, on the 6th instant, bringing pronunciamiento of the city of Vera Cruz, in favor A SANTA ANNA, who accordingly left Havana, the night of the 8th instant, on board the British steamer Montezuma, for Vera Cruz.

The Havana papers, particularly the Diario de la Marina, contain copious details of the news brought by the British mail sceamer. The advices are from Mexico to the 29th and from Vera Cruz to the 31st

The following is the Veto Message of Mr. Pol.k, upon the French Spoliation Bill, sent to the Senate on the night of the 8th instant. It is a miserable attempt to avoid the payment of a debt that should long since have been cancelled, and the justice of which has been repeatedly acknowledged by one or the other branch of the National Legislature. The pretext as-sumed by the President that the Bill would draw money out of the Treasury and embarrass the Goverment at the present time, is shallow and worthless because it is well known that not a cent would have

been obtained for three or four years, in consequence of the time required by the commissioners under the ict, before making awards. In this Veto the President has no longer the frail support of squeamish constitutional scriples to restupon, but is compelled to assume that the debt is doubtful, and that it would be imprudent to pay the oney now. This is the sum total of his reasoning. Admirable justifications, these, for the exercise of a benefit the act was passed!

To the Senate of the United States:

I return to the Senate, in which it originated, the Bill entitled "An act to provide for the accertainment and antisfaction of claims of American citizens for spoliations committed by the French prior to the 31st of July, 1801," which was presented to me on 6th instant, with my objections to its becoming a law. In attempting to give the Bill the careful examination it requires difficulties presented themselves in the outset, from the remoteness of the period to which the claims belong, the complicated nature of the transactions in which they originated, and the protracted negotiations to which they led between France and the United States. The short time intervening between the passage of the Bill by Congress and the approaching close of their session, as well as the pressure of other official duties, have not permitted me to extend my examination of the subject into its minute sure of other official duties, have not permitted meterated my examination of the subject into its mind details. But in the consideration that I have been able to give to it, I find objections of a grave character to its reovisions.

details. But in the consideration that I have been able to give to it, I find objections of a grave character to its provisions.

For the satisfaction of the claims provided for it, is proposed to appropriate five millions of dollars. I can perceive no legal or equitable ground upon which this large appropriation can rest. A portion of the claims have been more than halfa century before the government, in its Executive or Legalstive Departments, and all of them had their origin in events which occurred prior to 1800. Since 1802 they have been from time to time before Congress. No greater necessity or propriety exists for providing for these claims at this time than has existed for near halfa century: during all which period this questionable imeasure has never until the present time received the favorable consideration of Congress. It is rearcely probable, if the claim had been regarded as obligatory upon the Government, or constituting an equitable demand upon the Treasury has often been in a condition to enable the Government of the objective to the claimants. The Treasury has often been in a condition to enable the Government to do so without inconvenience, lift the claims had been considered just. These circumstances alone are calculated to raise strong doubts in respect to these claims; and especially, as all information necessary to a correct judgment concerning them, has been long before the public — These doubts are strengthened in my suind by the exomination. The bill assumes that the United States have become liable in those ancient transactions to make reparation to the claimants for injuries committed by France. Nothing was obtained for claimants by negotiation; and the bill assumes that the Government has become many ways responsible for these claima. The limited time allowed me, before your adjournment, makent impossible to restrate the facts and arguments by which, in preceding Congresse, these claims have been successfully reassed.
