"There are ways and means by which the enemy may be successfully annoyed, their spirit of resistance and endurance broken, and all the results of a successful war secured; and this not by cruel or unusual hostilities, but without a departure from any, the most humane, usage so for civilized warfare. At present, all the maxims of war are reversed; the vanquished is quartered on the victor; the invading army, misted of carrying terror, scatters gold and plenty in its path." We do not believe there is a country in Christen-

om which would have prosecuted a war with an enemy on the extraordinary and misplaced principles of philanthropy that have characterised the contest with Mexico.
