He was one of the little band who followed Washington across the Delaware to Twenton on the night of Christmas, 1776, and who left their foot-prints in blood on the snow. He was at Valley Forge dering the terrible winter which followed, and suffered his share of the privations that pursued officer and man alike. In all these circumstances he honorably acquitted himself. He lived to the great age of timety, retaining his faculties to the last. All his fellow soldiers who served in his regiment had gone before him. With his death the last link that united that portion of the Pennsylvatia line to the present, was broken forever.

He was at two soldier. Up to the morning of his death he was accounted from the sea of war in Mexico. It was his frequent and fervent wish that, if he should live to see his country again endangered, he might behold all his numerous male descendents together in arms for her defence. It was almost with this wish on his lips that he expired.
