## BATON ROUGE AND NEW ORLEANS.

They said it was very likely, and that the transfer should be made at once. Our brethren of Baton Rouge have all equality and target all our countrymen the transfer of their object is to do. Their paper is a daily object, while ours is a weekly. Their paper leads to the inevitable conclusion that they are defending a victory cause. People will say that the wounded pigeons known by us

are still in the air.

We trust our brothers of Baton Rouge will

be right and simple justice to the press of New Orleans. It is not wise to suppose that the press of New Orleans is in the hands of the friends of the Government.

No proposition having been pre-

pared by any member of the New Orleans

legislature, it is to be hoped that

the transfer of the seat of Government

will be made at once.

Since that period, the compact has not been

violated by us for 20 years; that is,

since our resolution to re-constitute New Or-  
leans, and treat her as a Parochial and as an  
ecclesiastical, without regard, and as a state of  
the church.
