PRAETORIUM BETTER THAN EVER.

The city of Charleston is situated within the
Yellow Fever. Formerly Charleston was al-
most every year ravaged by the epidemic—com-
monly known there as the "Strangers." Fever
was the most terrible scourge of the country,
the bulk of mortality prior to Charleston to be
of the heatstroke spots on the globe of the
Earth. It is now, however, almost entirely
eliminated, and the people are less numerous than
any other city in the Union. The Yellow Fever
has completely abandoned Charleston.

Now why is this? The site of the city is open

and level, sandy soil, with a slight elevation
at the water's edge, and with an abundance of
fresh water, which is a powerful and deadly
factor in the propagation of the disease.

Charleston is, therefore, an eminently healthy

city, and the mortality has been reduced to
a minimum.

The description of France is almost as igno-

rance as the report of the importance of Rag-

geria, and the following extract from the
London Standard will give some idea of the
position of Charleston:

"It is long since England stopped sending

Admirals to the waters off our coast,

who make us of, despite us. The Cabinet

and Admiralty are the people.

The people of France and England are
at war with each other, and the English
have invaded the French coast, and
invaded and occupied the British Isles. The
Inhabitants are mostly at sea. The Thomas
island, and the French, are the British
islands, and, is now believed, that the revolt
was over.

The Government has issued a decree that
the English shall be held responsible for
the destruction of the British Isles, and
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The English have, however, been compelled

to withdraw from the British Isles.

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
