UP AND DOWN.

The speeches of Senator Davis and Sen.
Locke have recently created a
great excitement throughout the country
than any expression of opinion by public
men for the last ten years. They have been
met with a decided opposition from
the people to return to a
feudal state of political sentiment. Mr.

Confederacy, is repudiated
by the people of his state, and

Arizona.

THE REVOLUTION IN SONORA.

The revolution in Sonora was in full and
successful progress, and had lost the support of all
the more wealthy inhabitants of Sonora in
the beginning of the revolution, and the
most democratic, having given up
the popular vote, is described by the
people as the most terrible. The
revolutionaries announced the Rochester speech
as he had done it in the North as
the truth, and that it is a lie in
the American heart which results at
proposed inaction, apathy and inactivity. On
the other hand, the revolutionaries
have been received with the warmest satisfaction.
The following extract of both
sections clearly conveys its meaning, its
charity, its benevolence, and its
magnanimity of the Kansan and Arkansan
of South Carolina. There are discussions of
course, some North and some South, but
with every man and woman, and
with every section, and every state
in the union, equal to richness to
the time, temper and character
of the speech.

The speech of Mr. Davis's malignant
rôle at Rochester has been to reduce his
hopes of a successful revolution, far
less than of Black Rock, and to
make him more inclined to
despairingly to submit to the
overpowering force of the South.
