The steamer Oceanus, Captain Richards, arrived yesterday afternoon from Vicksburg, from which place she left on the 21st instant, with supplies intended for the rebels, bound to Mobile.

General Lee has informed us that General J. E. Grant still holds his headquarters at Vicksburg, General Long commanding the post and General McPherson the troops in garrison.

A fleet of boats arrived at Vicksburg on the night of the 1st from Yazoo, but Capt. Richards learned no particulars of their voyage.

The steamer Imperial, bound for St. Louis, arrived at Vicksburg on the 21st, and proceeded on her voyage.

The steamer J. H. Groveson, Southwestern, Captain W. A. Hall, and Mr. Herrell were being sent to Vicksburg, and the Lancaster, Foster Queen and Gladiator, at Natchez.

Latest Southern News.

An extra Extra of yesterday afternoon publishes the following:

We have received a copy of the Mobile Evening Register of the 17th, from which we take the following interesting news:

Braxton, July 17.—Our army quietly withdrew from Jackson all of Friday last, to pursue its course.

The shot, wounded and mortally have all been removed.

The author did not discover our retreat till daylight, and has made no effort to pursue.

Our army is in line of battle to pursue.

Richardson, July 15.—The President has issued a proclamation declaring, in his judgment, that the laws of the land require that every man capable of bearing arms between 18 and 45, should be called out to his duty in defense of his country, in driving back the invader, and in saving the Southern Confederacy. He therefore calls out all white men, residing in the Confederate States, between the ages of 18 and 45, who are not subject to this call, now, or may be called, to the object of the campaign of their respective States, under the command of their respective Governors. He further orders that it shall be lawful for any person embodied, within this call, to volunteer for the service of the United States.

Exxon, July 15.—The Yankee, foolish in James River, is reported at Beauregard's Headquarters, near City Point, this evening.

No verbal communication with Winchester has been interrupted for two days, and it is believed that the wires have been cut by the rebels in the vicinity of the Potomac and Winchester. The Central train this evening brought no news.

Richmond, July 15.—A large number of officers and privates, wounded at Gettysburg, are here.

Letters and verbal reports all represent our army in the field in spirits and ready for the attack.

The feeling of uneasiness recently, prevailing here has given place to one of general confidence in the ability of our men and their gallantry in the ranks.

Rebel forces, however, are now in full force.

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
