CONNECTICUT REJECTS NEGRO SUFFRAGE.

NEW YORK, October 3.—It is understood that the President will repudiate the Louisiana Constitution of 1864, and appoint a Provisional Governor of the State.

The President refuses to remove Gen. Palmer from Kentucky, but will order the withdrawal of negro troops.

THE PEOPLE OF CONNECTICUT have rejected the proposition to allow negro suffrage, by a majority of 5000.

IMPORTANT TREASURY STATEMENT.

Washington, October 3.—An official state-

ment of the public debt shows a decrease of \$100,000,000 and a half million since the 31st of August.

cess of fifty millions, at 6 per cent., pre-  
sumed to be added to the sum of one hundred thousand dollars in bonds for one hundred  
years.
