**The Abolition Question in Cuba—Im-
proved sugar-making.**

The Poor Minister of a recent date contained
a highly interesting letter from Havana, which
treats of the active attention given there
to the subject of the abolition of slavery, and
of extensive improvements in sugar-making
in Cuba. Indeed. It would seem that the
importance of the subject has been so great, on all
sides of the Cuban Islands, that it has
excited the soft and sensitive atmosphere which,
in that delicious climate, seems to wrap the
population in a sort of opiate indifference to
the storms and tides, and currents that have
so far impaled them upon their tranquil shores. They are beginning
to turn their attention to the sugar plantations,
which have covered other countries, and eventually some seem to have
themselves with an inexorable demand for ser-
vices as the condition of social existence and
prosperity.

A meeting of wealthy slave owners, capital-
ists, and well-known merchants, Crooks and
Lindsey, were held at the house of Mr. G. O.
Farrill, to take into consideration various pro-
jects for the abolition of slavery. Colonel
Montejo suggested a plan based on the pur-
chase of their freedom by the labor of the
slaves, who was also proposed to effect a sum
of \$10,000,000, in order to indemnify the
planters of the rate of \$500 for each em-
ancipated slave.

Mr. Hirsh, on behalf of a number of planters
owning more than one hundred thousand
slaves, advocated the policy of immediate eman-
cipation and the conversion of the slaves into
free laborers, who would be liable to labor ten
years for their masters, or to be freed during
that period at the rate of four dollars a
month. At the end of the ten years, the em-
ancipated would have the option of changing
their place of labor or reverting their former
condition. In the division of opinion, and
dissension, however, it was voted to leave the
matter to the discretion of the Government, and
that, for the interest of the blacks themselves,
an apprenticeship more or less prolonged
should be adopted.

These divisions of view show the impor-
tance of studying the question profoundly, and
of profiting by the lessons taught by the ex-
amples of England and France on the same
subject. "A number of members, at Havana," (we
are told) "estimated at about 378,000; but it is
indispensible that exact statistics should serve as
a basis for practical solution, once a principle
of action has been agreed on." We contain
the quotation.

The Cuban blasters are well aware that it is
impossible to resolve so difficult a problem, with-
out the consent and cooperation of the metro-
polis; hence they will be obliged to bind a com-
pact with the Government of the United States,
Master of the University of Cuba, and deputed
to lay before the Queen a memorial, dated the
1st instant, and bearing over twelve, three

"We are informed that a number of cap-
