RECONSTRUCTION BILL.  
The Reconstruction bill, introduced by Mr. Sumner, on the 1st of December, has been passed by the House of Representatives, and is now in the hands of the Senate. The bill provides for the reconstruction of the States which have seceded from the Union, and for the restoration of the rights of the freedmen. The bill is a landmark in the history of the Republic, and its passage is a great triumph for the Union and for the freedmen.

RECEIPTS AND PAYMENTS.  
The receipts and payments of the Treasury Department for the month of January, 1868, are as follows: Receipts, \$1,000,000; Payments, \$1,200,000. The deficit for the month is \$200,000. The Treasury Department is expected to continue to have a deficit for the year, but it is believed that the deficit will not be as large as it has been in previous years.
