Bovel Sight Is Witnessed on the Wa ters of Lake Pepin.

Rukard Hurd, of St. Paul, Minn., has a number of box kites, and Sunday morning he brought three of the largest sues to Frontenac for the purpose o Sving them. He conceived the idea of making use of the kites as a motive power for boats and tried the experiment.

With a companion, Edward Honek, of Prontenac, he attached the largest of the kites to a rowboat on Lake Pepin at Lakeside hotel point and made the trip to the Lake City point in less than one hour, covering a distance of nearly sight miles. The kite as it glided over the water had the appearance of an air ship.

LUCINDA HORN HONORED. Menument to Woman Who Served

in War with Bor Eusband. An event of unusual interest has just occurred at the grave of Lucinda-Hora, away in the backwoods of Saluda county, until last year a part of Edgefield, . C. But so quietly and unostentatiquely were the arrangements made and the programme carried out that the announcement of the unveiling of a monument of marble with a graceful shaft to the memory of this woman, who went through the war by her husband's side, was the first knowledge conveyed to the remainder of the state that such action was contemplated. It is said that nowhere in the world, with the exception of that to Joan of Arc, has another monument been raised to a woman in commemoration of bravery on the battle field and endur-

ing the trials and hardships of war. The monument was conceived and the plans carried out by Capt. George B. ### FROM MOVING TRAINS.

Problem of Sending and Neosiviae Telegrams at Lest Solved.

Boorge V. Trott Devises & Syste Which Will Be Put in Eperation on the Pennsylvania Battroad.

George V. Trott, a former telegraph operator at Chicago, has devised a mystem which will shortly be put into operation on the Pennsylvania railroad, by which every train on the line is in constant communication with the station next shead, and, when desired, with the train dispatcher or any public telegraph station.

Briefly, every train on a road equipped with the Trott system would at all times be on a "loop" circuit, extending to the next telegraph station shead, and to send messages further or receive them from other stations, the operator at the proper station would only have to "cut in" by means of "jack spring" on one of the regular telegraph wires.

The device, which railway engineers declare will revolutionize railway telegraphy, is an adaptation of the street railway trolley, or third rail of the elevated railways. Two insulated metallic tracks are laid:

between and parallel to the traction rails. They are not connected, and at! intervals, equal in length to the circontinuous and separated by a nonconduction cushion. A trolley mechaniam, consisting of three pairs of wheels, connected in multiple by "knuckle"; joints and hinged to the footboard of, the engine, runs under the tender on the inner rails. The contact of the metallic wheels with the metallic rails closes the circuit, as the wheels are joined by a metallic framework. Insulated wires conduct the current into the engine cab, and by means of the bell cord into any part of the train, where there is an instrument.

#### A FREAK SHEEP.

Its Road Is Turned Upside Down and It Looks Backward.

One of the most wonderful freaks of nature probably inside the city limits of Philadelphia, says the Inquirer, is that of a sheep owned by T. K.
