In the Philippines the policy of the United States to assert the rights cedd by Spain was resisted by a large element in the island of Luzon especially, and a state of active warfare between American troops and the Filipinos, under Aguinaldo, extended from February until the early fall. No decisive battles were fought, but the Filiinos were routed at many important oints. The United States forces in the sland at the close of the year number 5.000 and the battle losses aggregate bout 2.300 killed and wounded.

Noted minor occurrences of the year were the failure of the old publishing firm of Harper & Bros., the burning of the Windsor hotel in New York, with a heavy loss of life, and the deaths of many filustrious people.

In the political world death chose as hining marks Caprivi, the successor f Bismarck as chancellor of the German empire; Faure, president of France: Castelar, the foremost Repubican of Spain: Vice President Hobart. and Grand Duke George, heir to the Russian throne.

Literature mourns the loss of Erckmann, the great novelist: Mrs. Southworth, Horatio G. Alger, the writer of boys' stories; Cherbuliez, French romancer and critic, and Busch, blographer of Bismarck. Art lost Rosa Bonheur, unrivaled in her sphere. Among editors who laid down the pen forever were Joseph Medill, founder of the Chicago Tribune, and Robert Bonner.

From other walks of life the grim reaper bore away Stephen J. Field, the noted jurist; Robert Ingersoll, General Guy V. Henry, hero of two wars; Kate Chase Sprague, a wartime belle; W. H. Appleton, the old time publisher: Emna Waller and Augustin Daly of the tage. Judge Henry Hilton, heir to A. r. Stewart's millions, and Cornelius Vanderbilt, head of the family fortunes and power.
