URGE BOXING IN SCHOOLS. President Harris and Superintendent Andrews, of Chicago, Encourage Students.

A series of boxing bouts which were held in the basement of the south division high school at Chicago the other night, finds favor in the eyes of the board of education authorities. President Graham H. Harris said he saw nothing wrong in it as long as Principal Smith sanctioned the boxing and had an instructor supervise it. Superintendent of Schools Andrews indorses the exercise. The bouts were under the direct supervision of instructor Perrina.

Mr. Smith says no brutality was displayed. Several of the trustees; including Mrs. Kenting and Schwab, have opposed pugilism in the high

schools. Principal Smith said: "These bouts were held at the request of the boys. I told them they could held them provided it was done in the presence of our regular athletic director. When the boys had their meeting I was informed of it and told Mr. Perrine to look after the matter. He did so and reported to me that there was nothing brutal in it. BUYING A CHURCH ORGAN.

Description of a Visit of the Trustees to the Establishment of a Builder.

The new church was a sightly edifice, completely equipped in every particular with one exception; it had a cabinet organ standing in the space designed for a church organ; but it was thought that they could wait a little for that. The church prospered and pretty soon the time came when it seemed reasonable to complete its outfit by putting in a suitable church organ; and a committee was appointed to this end from the board of trustees.

Looking about and getting estimates and so on, the committee came upon an organ which appeared to be suitable and desirable in every way, and could be bought for some hundreds of dollars less than its original cost of construction. This organ, which was then in the shop of its builder, had been taken out of the church for which it was made to make way for a larger organ. The committee reported favorably upon this instrument, and a day was set when the entire board should assemble at the organ builder's to hear it

That part of the organ builder's establishment in which the organs were put together was a great room, onehalf of which ran up through two stories clear in height, giving an ample and lofty space in which the biggest organs could be set up complete. There were organs of various sizes standing here and there in this great room, and among them, in course of erection, the new organ building for the church from which the smaller organ was taken.

This big new organ had pretty nearly all of its pipes on end, in place; they do not interfere with the studies and there was a man at work on them tuning them; he stood upon a narrow platform supported at a height of six to eight feet above the level of the floor, across the front of the organ and close to the pipes. In some manner he was enabled to let the air into these pipes separately, one after another, as he moved slowly along upon the platform testing them, blowing upon each pipe repeated blasts as with suitable implements he brought it to its correct tone.
