OUR PACE IS TOO FAST.

The Nervous Life of Americans Weakens Heart's Action and Causes Cardiac Troubles.

At the fourth annual convention of the American Therapeutic society recently held at Washington, a paper on "The Strenuous Life" was read by Dr. Oliver T. Osborne, of New Haven, Conn., and was received with interest and attention. Dr. Osborne said in part: "Several cases of late years have been at work to produce all sorts and kinds of neuroses of the heart or debility of the heart muscle and to hasten that degeneration of the circulatory system that comes normally only late in life."

BIGGEST MAP IN WORLD.

Outlines of the United States to Cover Five Acres of Land at St. Louis Fair.

On the southern slope of the hill that fronts the Philippine exhibit, the department of agriculture is making a map of the United States to cover five and one-half acres of ground. Considerable work has already been done at St. Louis by Mr. David A. Brodie, superintendent of the open air exhibit of the bureau of plant industry, of the department of agriculture, who has been in St. Louis since early spring in charge of the map project. Mr. Brodie and his assistant are laboriously drawing on the ground the jagged coast line of the United States.

BETRAYED BY THEIR SHOES.

A Shrewd Employer Has a Secret Way of Detecting Trick Habit Among Clerks.

GET GUNS FROM GERMANY.

The Manufacturers in the United States Are Too Busy to Make Them.

The war department at some time ago ordered 10,000 machine guns of the new design and type to be manufactured in Germany. The guns are now industrially completed and Capt. John W. Davis of the machine department has been directed to receive them at Brestport to have a quantity of ammunition with him shipped at the same time. The reason for ordering these guns from a German manufacturer was that the manufacturers in this country were too busy to fill the orders of the war department, only one out of 10 firms responding to a circular asking proposals and this one waiting two years within which to make deliveries again seven months by the German firm. The armaments of the United States also were overcrowded with work.

NEW EFFORT OF RED CROSS.

Miss Barton Issues Appeal to American People for Establishment of First Aid Department.

Miss Clara Barton, president of the American National Red Cross, has issued an appeal to the American people to assist the association in two new ventures. It is about to undertake, which will not, however, imply the contribution of funds to the cause. Miss Barton explains that two new branches of the association are being formed. The first is called the First Aid department, and will be largely educational. Its aim will be to place in the hands of everybody who can and is willing to buy it a surgical emergency case, together with an explanatory chart, prepared by the best surgical talent for use in case of accident and until the doctor can arrive. This kind of case and chart are used in Germany at the suggestion of the Red Cross, there. The other branch of the association will undertake the formation and training of emergency classes and ambulance corps in hotels, factories, railroad yards and other centers of industry and among the police and other public employees.

NOVEL SUBMARINE TESTS.
