Mr. W. O. Hart.

After an absence of two weeks spent in Chicago, Mr. W. O. Hart returned to the city yesterday. The Lafayette Celebration.

At the Lafayette celebration in this city, tomorrow, September 6, Mr. W. O. Hart, a member of the local committee, will read an account of the presentation to Washington by Lafayette of the key of the Bastille, which he sent to Mount Vernon with a letter dated March 17, 1790, closing with these words: "Give me leave, my dear General, to present you with a picture of the Bastille, just as it looked a few days after I ordered its demolition, with the main key of the fortress of despotism. It is a tribute which I owe as a son to my adopted father—as an aide-camp to my general—as the missionary of liberty to its patriarch."

CHAMPAGNE LOUIS ROEDERER REIMS

Washington wrote to Lafayette on August 11, acknowledging receipt of the letter and of the gifts accompanying it, describing them as "the token

of the victory gained by liberty over despotism."

In connection with the proposed Lafayette celebration which is expected will be general throughout the United States, the anniversary of his birthday, Mr. W. O. Hart, a member of the local committee and in touch with the National Committee, has suggested to the City of Lafayette in this State, the parish seat of Lafayette parish, that a celebration should be held in that city and will send on in due course copies of the programme of the celebration in this city and other matter appropriate to the occasion.

The bust of General Lafayette will be unveiled in Lafayette square at 7 p. m. All arrangements for the ceremonies have been completed by the committee of which Col. H. J. de la Vergne is chairman, at the meeting yesterday in the Mayor's parlor.

Prior to the unveiling ceremonies a reception will be held in the parlors of the mayor in the city hall, between the hours of 2 and 3 o'clock p. m.

Lafayette's day will be closed with a musical and oratorical programme in the Cabildo at 8 o'clock at night. Mrs. H. O. Bisset will sing the Marseillaise, and a choir of 40 will sing patriotic songs. Many tributes will be paid General Lafayette as a friend of American liberty and a great soldier.
