HAPPENINGS 60 YEARS AGO.

General statement of the statistics
of the State of Louisiana, taken from
the official rolls of 1847:By this statement it appears that
there are 35,560 qualified voters. The
whole white male population is set
down at 105,391; of whom 124 are in-
sane; 34 blind; 41 deaf and dumb; andone hundred years old, and over.
The white female population is 91,039;of whom 73 are insane; 28 blind; 37
deaf and dumb; and 3 one hundred
years old and over. The free colored
males are 4,830; females, 10,212; total,

15,042. The male slaves are 109,400;

females, 102,083; total, 211,483. The
whole population of the State is 427,-
765. The number of lawyers is 450;
physicians 600; wholesale merchants

43; retail merchants 2,534; coffee houses

and grog-shops 755; billiard tables

203; restaurants 46; cotton presses 11;

banks 8; negro traders 28; commission

merchants 443; brokers 200, etc., etc.,

etc. The quantity of land is 6,663,-
336 acres, of which 4,450,512 are cul-
tivated, yielding 222,685 bushels of cotton,24,017 hogshead of sugar, 384,982 bar-
rels of molasses, 9,453,077 bushels corn,

363 bushels of wheat, 823 bushels of

rye, 62,866 bushels oats, 3,747 carrots

tobacco, 2,043,023 pounds rice.
