HAPPENINGS 69 YEARS AGO.

Revolution in France.
The revolution in France has taken
the world by surprise, though every
man acquainted with the state of po-
litical feeling amongst her people an-
ticipated change whenever circum-
stances seemed favorable to action.
The death of Louis Philippe was gen-
erally regarded as about to be the in-
evitable signal for popular commotion
and the period when republicans and
Bonapartists would struggle to give
character to the future government.
But the popular will has hurried
him more suddenly from power than
he was elevated, and snatched the
crown from his head which fourteen
years since it bestowed with every
demonstration of confidence. How sig-
nificant of the growing importance of
the masses this sudden and success-
ful demonstration! The doctrine of
freedom and equality, although not
properly understood in Europe, is yet
believed. It is a belief of the heart
rather than the head, of feeling in-
stead of conviction. To prevent the
populace from rising against all au-
thority, and with blind violence, like
that of the avalanche, sweeping every
vestige of ancient institutions from
existence, concessions have been
made, and some degree of intellectual
culture with greater or less frugality
afforded, and while the one has in-
creased the strength of liberalism, the
other enables it to be more effective-
ly used. The bayonet and the dungeon
begin to lose their power and to be
shorn of their terrors; standing ar-
mies, consisting of individuals from
among the people fall to be certain
tools in the hands of self-willed men
to consecrate oppression; and feeling
their own influence in the government,
the people are ready to contest the en-
croachments of power. This has been
proved by the present revolution, and
the utter and sudden downfall of the
French king.

Elevated by a popular movement to
the throne, and assuming the crown
amidst the congratulations of a whole
nation, Louis Philippe might have
been the most popular sovereign of
the age. Taught during his exile in
youth, the truth of human equality,
and having witnessed the prosperity
of our republican country and the
general happiness diffused by our
system of government—as King of
France, he afterwards possessed all
the means necessary to have confer-
red similar blessings on his subjects.
Yet he was no sooner seated on the
throne, than, forgetting his pledges to
the people, and forgetful of the les-

... he had learned during exile, and
just previous to his elevation, he,
with an iron hand, curtails the liber-
ty which revolution had gained. Un-
der the pretence of securing Paris
from the insults of a foreign foe, he
girdled that city with frowning forti-
fications whose cannon could be as ef-
fectively used against it as against an
invading army; ostensibly to secure
against outbreaks of popular fury, but
in reality to prevent the spread of lib-
eral opinions, he restrained the liber-
ty of the press; under his sway, cor-
ruption crept into the courts of jus-
tice; and the sympathy of the nation
for those struggling to be free, found
no expression in the acts of the gov-
ernment. Encroachments upon privi-
leges won by blood, paved the way for
the downfall of monarchy, though
strengthened by foreign alliances, and
based to some extent upon conces-
sions to popular rights.

Coast and Geodetic Survey Nam-
ing and Numbering Its
Monuments.

Washington, September 11, 1916.
The Superintendent of the United
States Coast and Geodetic Survey, Mr.
E. Lester Jones, has recently issued or-
ders to the chief of each surveying
vessel and land party to stamp into
the face of the metal tablet marking
the surveying monuments the name or
number of the particular monument.
A tablet much used is inscribed as
follows: "U. S. Coast and Geodetic Sur-
vey Triangulation Station. For infor-
mation write to Superintendent,
Washington, D. C.; 250 fine or impris-
onment for disturbing this mark." In
the center of this mark is a triangle
and in the future the name of the sta-
tion will appear just below the tri-
angle. For instance, if a station is es-
tablished on Cape Hatteras, the name
"Hatteras" would be stamped on the
tablet. The bench marks established
in connection with the determination
of the mean sea level by tidal observa-
tions and of the elevations in the in-
terior of the country by precise level-
ing will be marked by tablets prop-
erly inscribed, on which the matter of
the bench mark will be stamped.
It is obvious that the name or num-
ber stamped on the tablet will enable
engineers and others to ask for the
geographic positions or data in regard
to the bench marks with the assurance
that those at headquarters will know
without the least doubt the monument
for which information is wanted. It
is not always practicable to stamp on
monuments the exact latitude and
longitude, or elevation (as the case
may be) for after the observations
have been made it is necessary that a
final computation be made at the of-
fice, which might give somewhat dif-
ferent results from those available
from the preliminary computations
made in the field at the time the mon-
ument was established. The cost of
sending a party over the same ground
to stamp the monuments with the final
results would not always be justified.
