## HAPPENINGS 60 YEARS AGO.

Gen. Taylor.

Real excellence grows brighter the longer it is the object to contemplate. It so impresses itself upon the mental vision that it becomes the prominent object of thought, as gazing upon the sun causes the image of that luminary to be seen in every quarter of the heavens towards which the eye is directed. But no single trait of excellence in human character can secure the continuance and growth of popular admiration. It is rather a combination of excellencies, a harmonious union of noble qualities of the heart and head, rendering their possessor truly great without elevating him in any one particular far above the common sympathies of men, which give him dominion over the feelings and affections of his countrymen. Not often does nature produce such a man. Those eminent for public service, and distinguished by lofty talent, are great in some particular sphere of action, and their greatness frequently acts as a foil to make their weakness the more conspicuous. Clay, Calhoun, Webster, Benton and Cass are men of extraordinary mental power, each differing from the other in their peculiar points of superiority; and each, in some respect, towering like the ice-clad summits of lofty mountain peaks, so far above ordinary men, as to create awe and respect among the masses, rather than electrifying all hearts with love, and harmonizing all by awakening common feelings of sympathy. Impetuosity and energy, rather than prudence, not unfrequently mark genius, and while we gaze with admiration upon its dazzling brightness, like the lightnings of heaven, its power more often creates fear than it awakens the idea of aid. Our revered Washington was in everything pre-eminent, yet seemed little elevated above common men. Whatever duty was imposed upon him, without ostentation, or the display of any extraordinary ability, was successfully executed. No emergency was ever too great for his capacity, nor any case too trivial for his attention. By the happy union of all rare qualities, he grew in public estimation until his fame became indelibly impressed on the hearts.

les influences germaniques, qui s'efforcent de lui faire oublier ses devoirs constitutionnels et lui conseillent une politique qui n'a d'autre object que de servir l'Allemagne.

La Grèce a refusé l'île de Chypre, la province de Smyrne et l'appui illimité des Alliés, pour travailler contre eux sur la seule promesse du Kaiser de répondre de l'intégrité de ses frontières. Aujourd'hui les Bulgares les ont envahis et souillent le sol national. Des Allemands les accompagnent et on déclare à Athènes que l'on ne s'oppose pas à leur entrée dans la capitale. Il semble impossible que le roi Constantin puisse persévérer dans cette attitude après la démonstration du 27 août. Tout ce qui apparaît jusqu'à présent, c'est la liquidation de l'étau-major germanophile, mais la manifestation à laquelle nous faisons allusion semble indiquer, de la part du peuple grec, le désir de mesures plus étendues en ce qui concerne la politique générale du royaume. Le rôle que la Grèce a eu à l'occasion de remplir avec gloire et profit vient d'être assumé par la Roumanie. Le peuple grec assiste, dans l'humiliation et la honte, à la ruine de ses espérances. Il croit pouvoir réparer encore une partie des désastres résultant de ses défaillances. Sur le conseil de M. Venizelos, il supplie son roi de l'aider. Pour l'honneur de la dynastie grecque, il faut espérer qu'elle s'appropriera les sentiments de la reine de Roumanie, déclarant que ses décisions royales doivent tre inspirées par le sentiment de la responsabilité envers le pays, et non par les alliances de famille.
