vance.****HAPPENINGS 69 YEARS AGO.****(By Count de G. —)****Monuments of the Mississippi.****(Continued.)****These relics, he thinks, must have****belonged to a race of civilized men****who must have disappeared many****centuries ago. To this race he attri-****butes the hieroglyphic characters****found on the limestone bluffs, the re-****mnions of cities and fortifications,****in Florida, and the regular parks****of ancient live oaks set near them. The****bricks found at Louisville were nine****feet below the surface, in regular****hearts, with coals of the last domes-****tic fire upon them. The bricks are****hard and regular, and longer, in pro-****portion to their width, than those of****the present day.****The second race of beings are at-****tributed the vast mounds of earth****found throughout the whole western****region, from lake Erie and West Penn-****sylvania to Florida and the Rocky****Mountains. Some of them contain skele-****tons of human beings, and display****immense labor. Many of them are regu-****lar mathematical figures, parallelo-****grammes, ellipses and sections of cir-****cles, showing the remains of gateways****and subterranean passages. Some of****them are eighty feet in height, and****have trees growing on them apparently****of the age of five hundred years.****They are generally of soil differing****from that which surrounds them, and****are most common in situations where****it has since been found convenient to****build towns and cities; one of these****mounds was levelled in the center of****Bühlcothe, and cart-loads of human****bones removed from it. One of these****mounds may be seen in Cincinnati, in****which a thin circular piece of gold,****allayed with copper, was found last****year. Another at St. Louis, called the****Falling Garden, is pointed out to stran-****gers as a great curiosity. Many frag-****ments of earthen-ware, some of cu-****rious workmanship, have been dug****up throughout this vast region; some****representing drinking vessels, some****human heads, and some idols. They all****appear to be moulded by the hand and****hardened in the sun. These mounds****are inferior to the first, which was****acquainted with the use of iron.****(To be continued.)**

**Large Increase in Number of Agricultural Schools**

The demand from all parts of the State for agricultural schools indicates very plainly the sentiment of the people for improvement in agricultural methods and conditions. The number of these schools has increased from 37 in 1914 and 52 in 1915 to 68 in 1916. They are located in 36 different parishes.

The primary purpose of the agricultural schools is to furnish instruction in the fundamentals of agricultural practice to boys in the rural districts.

Approximately 2,000 Louisiana farm boys are attending these schools. The class room work is supplemented by field work on the school farms, on which the best known methods of farming are in operation.

The agricultural schools of the State

have proved to be of much value in

Dépêche spéciale à l'Abeille. Paducah, Ky., 16 octobre. — Deux nègres de la localité ont été lynchés et leurs cadavres brûlés par la population de notre ville. Ces deux nègres étaient inculpés, l'un d'avoir attaqué sans résultat une dame de la région, et le second d'avoir hautement déclaré que son congénère avait bien fait. La foule fut irruption dans la prison municipale qui détenait les deux noirs, et sur le refus du directeur de lui livrer les coupables, brisa les portes et ayant conduit les noirs devant leur victime pour identification, les mit immédiatement à mort.
