A Signal of Distress from the Bel-
gian Bishops to Public Opinion.

The Story of the Belgian Deportations

(Continued from Yesterday.)

There were other ways of providing
for the maintenance of professional
skill among our workpeople, such as
leaving to Belgian industry its ma-
chinery and accessories, its raw mate-
rials and its manufactured goods,
which have passed from Belgium into
Germany. And it is not to the quarries
and lime-kilns to which the Germans
themselves declare they will send our
unemployed, that our specialists would
think of giving to complete their pro-
fessional education.

The naked truth is that every de-
ported workman is another soldier for
the German army. He will take the
place of the German workman who
will be made into a soldier. Thus
the situation which we denounce to
the civilized world may be reduced to
these terms: Four hundred thousand
workmen have been thrown out of
work by no fault of their own, and
largely on account of the "régime" of
the occupation. Sons, husbands, and
fathers of families, they bear their un-
happy lot without murmuring, re-
spectful of public order; national so-
lidarity provides for their most press-
ing wants; by dint of a generous par-
simony and self-denial, they escape
extreme destitution, and they await
with dignity, and in a mutual affec-
tion which our national mourning in-
tensifies, the end of our common trial.

Bands of soldiers break into their
peaceful homes, snatch youths from
their parents, the husband from his
wife, the father from his children,
guard with fixed bayonets the doors
through which wives and mothers at-
tempt to pass to bid a last farewell to
those who are leaving them; march
their captives in groups into open
trucks; the engine stands ready under
full steam; as soon as the train is
full a superior officer gives the signal
for departure. Here we have another
thousand Belgians reduced to slavery;
condemned, without previous trial, to
the severest penalty in the penal code
save the death-penalty — deportation.
They not where they are going, not
for how long. All they know is that
their work will benefit no one but
their enemies. From some of them, by
bribes or threats, an engagement has
been extorted which is shamelessly
called "voluntary."

TO THE PUBLIC.

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Antwerp that at Liege, Namur, and
Charleroi, youths had been seized and
forcibly carried off to Germany, I
begged governor of Henne to be so
good as to confirm in writing the oral
assurances he had given me. He re-
plied that the rumors of deportations
were baseless, and gave me, without
hesitation, the following written decla-
ration, which was read aloud on
Sunday, October 18, 1914, in all the
parish churches of the province of
Antwerp: "Young men need have no
fear to be enrolled in the army, or to
be subjected to forced labor."

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Louisiana Historical Society.

At the session of the General Assem-
bly of Louisiana recently closed, there
was passed an Act prepared by Mr
W. O. Hart, a member of the executive
committee of the Louisiana Historical
Society, by which the State hereafter
through the Secretary of State, will
print the yearly report of the Society
and a quarterly journal as is done in
most of the States for their historical
societies; the passage of the Act
through the General Assembly was larg-
ely due in the Senate to the efforts
of Senators John C. Davey, John Dym-
ond, Leon R. Smith and E. M. Staf-
ford, and in the House, Representatives
N. W. Bond, J. J. A. Fortier, C.
F. Labarre and G. C. Kinsenberger.
