PETER WAS FINED FOR GIVING BAD ADVICE

Peter Sanderfort, who is alleged to have told negroes in Bogalusa, La., that they would be fools to join the United States army, was arrested at the Terminal station yesterday by department of justice agents and fined \$20 and 20 days in jail by Second Recorder Louis Barthe. The authorities say Sanderfort tried to great dissension among the negroes of Bogalusa and hurried from that place before the police could catch him. The authorities there learned he was heading for New Orleans and notified government agents here. So they were at the station to welcome him as he stepped from the train.

JUSTICE WILL WAIT ON MR. HARGROVE'S BUSINESS

A continuance in the case of Edgar Hargrove, traveling salesman, charged with shooting Mrs. Mathilda Konemann last February, was granted in the First City Criminal court yesterday by Judge Fisher. Counsel for the defense asked for the continuance on the grounds that his client had some important business to look after. The shooting of Mrs. Konemann created a sensation in New Orleans. After wounding her, Hargrove turned the gun upon himself, but inflicted only a scalp wound. Neither was the woman dangerously hurt. The attempted murder and suicide took place in the lobby of the Grunewald Hotel while crowds were gathering for a convention.
