FRANCE WILL DEMAND, NOT INDEMNITY BUT RESTITUTION

Paris, May 25.—America, with her well known views on fair play, from her seat at the council table when peace is finally declared...

This, in my opinion, is the real secret of the savage destruction of our country by Hindenburg...

The problem presented is capable of a natural and easy solution as well as a practical one. The duty of our allies will be to impose upon the Germans the heavy task of repairing themselves the damages they have caused during the war...

First, that the Germans and Austrians be required to send into the devastated countries a number of workmen sufficient to level the ground, to fill up the trenches, to destroy the deep-dug military shelters and actually prepare the destroyed ground so that it will be capable of being tilled...
