> "We are fighting disinfectants that do not disinfect," said Dr. J. T. A. Wolker, a consulting chemist. here and one of those behind the movement to har out bogus germiwides. "The francis were able to perate without fearing the pure food and deug act because disinfeetants are neither foods nor

"Many people, even medical men, buy widely advertised alleged germicides and use fliem in their homes, when they might better be using so much water. The situation is highly dangerous.

Success had come to the bure disinfectant bill in Connecti**#**at, he† said, because the honest manufacurers of disinefetants are now behind the movement. Formerly they opposed a labelling law. This killed a similar bill on the two occasions when it was introduced at Albany.

Now Senator Wadsworth of New York, has a bill to force correct labeling of disinfectants before Con-I gress, and Dr. Walker said the atti-I tude of the manufacturers insures ifs passage, opposition having practically disappeared. The federal law, he added, would drive bogus disinfectants out of practically the whole country, because most of the fake disinfectant traffic is interstafe.
