
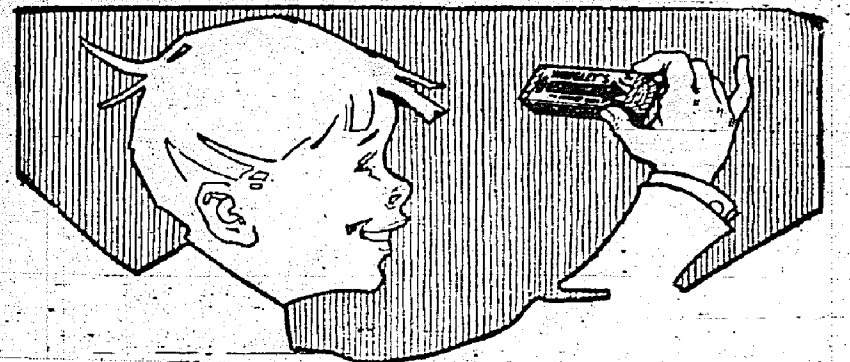

**PREACHERS MASKED TO SPEAK ON VICE**

URGED BY FEDERAL BUREAU TO OBSERVE FEBRUARY 23 AS HEALTH SUNDAY.

Washington, Feb. 14.—As a step in a nation-wide campaign against the social evil, ministers and church leaders are urged in a pamphlet issued by the United States Public Health Service to observe February 23 as Health Sunday, with special sermons and meetings that day devoted to discussion of means of improving morals.

Separate meetings for men and women are suggested to consider elimination of vice districts, education of children, the organization of a permanent community committee to improve civic conditions and to provide wholesome recreation, especially for returning soldiers.

"The public health campaign is a community task," said the Public Health Service's announcement. "The church, as an important part of the community, should be called to help in this important work."

Cities and towns throughout the country now face a most important crisis. Under control of the military authorities four million soldiers and sailors received greater protection against disease than they received before the war in civil life. The federal government must of necessity in the next few months give up wartime control. It is the social responsibility of cities and towns to make their communities fit places to receive the returning soldiers.

**BOLSHEVIK, MEANING MAJORITY MISNOMER**

MISSIONARY SAW TERRORS OF REIGN IN RUSSIA AND TURKEY.

Translation of the term Bolsheviki meaning "majority" indicates the useless of the title of the revolutionists, according to Milhorn Bomburian, for thirty-seven years a Christian missionary to Persia and Turkey, who has arrived in New Orleans on a visit to his brother and sister, Mempre and Elizabeth Bomburian, 723 Higny street. After a separation of seven years the missionary joined his wife and children in Detroit several weeks ago, at the end of a 400-day journey from the Orient, traveling under almost constant danger of death.

Accompanying him on the journey by horse-cart through Persia, by river boats on the Volga and the Caspian sea, through Siberia and finally on an ancient Arctic ocean boat to Newcastle, England, were his sister, her three children and two Persian women, struggling to reach America through Turkish and Bolsheviki persecution. What carried them safely over all obstacles was a supply of Persian money, worth almost fifty times its actual value in Siberia, where any form of money is rare.

American trains could have made in one day the journey through Persia, which would take less than one day by train, Mr. Bomburian said.

"The country was overrun with starving refugees from the Turks—Armenians, most of them a wretched population of more than 20,000, Persian people and merchants with food would not sell for, they say famine counts. Further on in the journey we found Red Cross and Y. M. C. A. depts. which helped us wonderfully with food and assistance of all kinds. I got a very vivid impression of the Bolsheviki movement. You know Bolsheviki means majority—but it is not a good title, for they are by no means in the majority and have no order among themselves. The Russians have lived so long under oppression that their necks are rubbed raw by the yoke of the czar. They swore to break yoke and now they are blindly seeking to even up scores. No one thinks of work, and they are blindly imagining that they are forming a free nation by force."

Mr. Bomburian has heard of John C. Hines and other famous Communist leaders and former members of the Christian settlement at Ansonia, N. Y., who organized the first Communist party in the U.
