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WILL IT DROP IN THIS WAY?

Capt. H. M. Carter of the Carter Packet Company, says he has been forced to discontinue the steamer Elam between New Orleans and Harrisonburg because of lack of patronage.

Mr. Walter Parker, special inland traffic expert of the Department of Commerce, on the other hand, says that steamboat traffic on the rivers is declining, because the steamboat owners do not solicit business and because the way landings are in poor condition.

LEGISLATIVE NOTES

Representative Powell's fence cutting bill seems to have aroused much inquiry among the cut over farmers.

The bill empowering police juries to appropriate land for a right of way for the inter-coastal canal will do away with several "hold ups" which have blocked construction at different points.

Senator Stafford's bill for a commission to study the question of mother's pensions met such a chilly reception before the senate that it froze to death, but later was revived and is still pending.

A number of measures are now on the final passage in the House. Among them are bills creating a state council of defense, prohibiting aliens from having fire arms, permitting expropriation of land for the intercoastal canal.

The state constabulary bill is considering considerable opposition.

Chances for a measure providing salaries for the state board of public utilities appear to be slim.

The bill to make Alexandria dry will probably die a peaceful death.

No enthusiasm seems to have been aroused by the bill making vagrants of all men who fail to work thirty six hours a week.

A Louisiana branch of the National League to Enforce Peace was organized by members of the legislature Thursday night.

The bill restoring control of public roads to police juries, and annulling the road supervisors bill of the regular session has been favorably reported.

The "home guard" or "constabulary" bill carries a \$10,000 annual appropriation.

If the State Council of Defense bill passes, Louisiana will have \$25,000 more a year to pay.

The Slab Food bill puts control of food, fuel, seeds, etc., in the hands of the State Council of Defense.

The cattle tick bill, the vagrancy bill, the insurrection and sedition bill and the roads bill restoring police juries their ancient privileges were stated for final passage by the senate Monday night.
