# Task Three-Fourths Completed at 9:35 Last Night; Quota of New Orleans Will Be Chosen from Numbers Appearing Below

Washington, July 20.—The 7,500th number was drawn at 9:35 o'clock tonight. With 3,000 more numbers yet to be drawn, it seemed possible that the drawing would be completed before 2 o'clock this morning, which is earlier than was anticipated.

> Only half of those drafted today will be needed in the first army of about 650,000. It is estimated half the number drawn will be climinated on account of physical disability and legal exemptions.

> Many localities will not be competled to furnish any men as they have already supplied their quota through volunteers in the army and navy.

> Att day long the press wires have been transmitting numbers. Little other matter was handled on the telegraph wires and tonight it was indicated it would be early tomorrow morning before the drawing is complete.
