RADICAL CHANGES MADE IN FOODBILL PASSED BY SEN

Congressional Committee to Watch Contracts and Expenditures---Hoover Will Be Only One of Three on Food Board

Washington, July 21.—After four weeks of discu Senate tonight passed a bill giving the food supply of the camtry into government control. The final vote was 8f to 6. The six voting against the bill were Senators Hardwick, France, Penrose, Reed, Sherman and Sutherland.

Various amendments were accepted, the most startling being that of Senator Owen establishing a joint committee on war ex-

Other amendments adopted were those establishing a minimum price for wheat of \$2 until July 1, 1919; regulating the sale of coal by government control and allowing the Federal Trade Commission to fix the prices; authorizing the expenditure of \$10,000,000 for the purchase of Chilean nitrates; presquting speculation in the grain exchanges, and authorizing the President to close them if necessary; authorizing the President in The Baldwin automobile disap- charge cash for such fuel, wheat and moole
