CUTTING THE COST OF DELIVERY

A special meeting of the merchants of New Orleans has been called for this morning. The purpose of the meeting is to consider the recommendation of the Council of National Defense...

ITEMS OUT OF THE ORDINARY FROM THE DAY'S COURT GRIND

In a suit for an alleged debt of day against A. Deereana, by Charles Gussoni, on behalf of himself and party of San Francisco yesterday secured an attachment for 1,600 tons of Chilean nitrate at the Stuyvesant docks...

The claimant alleges that it charged the Beldridge to the firm of Anthony Gibbs and Son, of London, England, on June 15, to bring the nitrate here. The rate agreed on was \$33 a ton, amounting to a total for the trip of \$124,212.

It is alleged that the defendants have paid \$37,047, leaving an unpaid balance of some \$87,000. It may be noted incidentally that the cargo rate of \$33 a ton for the trip the steamship Beldridge earned on this one trip close to half its total value before the present war.

CANE DELIVERY VIA GOOD ROADS
