Wreck of Frisco passenger train

The wreck of a Frisco passenger train between Opelousas and Baton Rouge cost the lives of conductor W. C. Ennis and Florence Kiplow, a colored girl. Detective Michael J. Coyle has resigned, Corporal John W. Mahen of the Third precinct being appointed to succeed him. Detective Coyle's conduct on the day of the shooting of Superintendent Reynolds is said to have led to the request for his resignation. Gov. Pleasant Saturday issued a proclamation to the women of Louisiana to help supply the knitted articles for the soldiers to be supplied by the American Red Cross. The local exemption boards have nearly all closed up their work in connection with the first draft. The first installment of drafted men, five per cent of the total, will leave for their camps Wednesday. The annual firemen's festival will be held at Southern Park next Saturday, September 8.

Mrs. W. J. O'Donnell has been chosen as the superintendent of the horse department for the coming National Farm and Live Stock show. The Bayou Bridge Social and Pleasure club has chosen E. St. Amant, 3141 Esplanade, president; Francis Salas, 1648 Moss, vice-president; Charles Hagan, secretary, and E. Espino, treasurer. Governor Pleasant and Mayor Behrman were the principal speakers at the seventeenth annual Labor Day celebration and picnic at Southern Park Monday under the auspices of the Central Trades and Labor Council of New Orleans and its vicinity. Edgar J. Bouligny, of New Orleans, who has been with the French forces since a few weeks after Germany and France went to war, has been transferred from the trenches and is now a "sergent aviateur" in the Aviation Corps.

Mrs. Mary A. J. Meynier, wife of August F. Schmalz, whom she says conducts the Star Realty Company at 297 Wells Fargo Building, filed action in the Civil District Court Saturday for separation and for an injunction to restrain her husband from selling any property belonging to them in community. She asked the custody of the minor children, Joseph (7 years); Mary, 13 years and Edwin (9). There are two other children, Francis, 23, and Caroline, 21. Mrs. Schmalz alleges her husband called her "crooked," meaning thereby that she was not virtuous and respectable, that for the last four years he has not supported her properly.

The heirs of Ike Herdman, so-called "Miser King of the Tenderloin," who left an estate valued at about \$450,000 less \$200,000 encumbrances, have been found in Odessa, Russia, and a local attorney, Harry P. Sneed, has been retained by the heirs through the American consul at Odessa, to recover the estate. One son, a small candy dealer in Odessa, is living and there are five children surviving one of Herdman's daughters, and two from the other. The son will get one-third and a third each will be divided between the children of his daughters. All the heirs occupy obscure positions. Former Senator Murphy J. Foster, now collector of customs at New Orleans, is being urged by some of his friends in different section of the state to become a candidate for United States senator against Senator Joseph E. Ransdell, and powerful support has been promised if the former senator will agree to enter the race. The movement to bring the St. Mary man into the senatorial contest took shape toward the close of the special session of the Legislature in July and has gained considerable headway.

James Ringe, 7 years 2238 Baracks street, was drowned Monday afternoon when he fell from the wharf of the Bayou St. John at Spanish Fort into the lake. Strenuous attempts were made by physicians from the Charity Hospital to save his life. Ringe, with his father, John A. Ringe, and a friend, John Kake, 10 years, 623 North Tonit street had been fishing and bathing and were taking a walk along the Bayou. The boy lost his footing. It was learned Monday Mrs. Anthony Boscarino, age 21, 516 South Tonti street, who is said to have left New Orleans Thursday with her 3-year-old son, Peter, for Cincinnati, where she was arrested by federal officers together with John Larino, age 27, of 1020 Esplanade avenue, had known Larino before her marriage to Boscarino about four years ago. According to relatives, Mrs. Boscarino's desire for fine clothes and a good time are the primary causes for leaving her husband. She was Miss Henrietta Prades. When Mrs. Boscarino failed to return

In the death of Dr. Delphin Bienvenu, at 81, as the result of an automobile accident Sunday night, New Orleans lost one of its oldest and most noted physicians. Dr. Bienvenu died in Charity Hospital three hours after being struck by the automobile of Henry Meyers, 4162 Ann street. Dr. Bienvenu was the oldest living graduate of Spring Hill College. He was a native of New Orleans. He studied medicine and pharmacy and at the outbreak of the war offered his services to the Confederacy. He served as pharmacist until the end. After the war he returned to New Orleans and continued in active practice until fifteen years ago.

A Texas and Pacific passenger train westbound on the way from Marshall, Tex., to Alexandria, ran into an open switch near Boyce at 9 o'clock Sunday night and crashed into several oil tanks and box cars. None of the cars were derailed, but twelve persons on the train were slightly injured from the impact. It is not known how the switch came to be open, but it is a supposition that it was done by someone in an attempt to wreck the train.
