Sol Bloodworth, secretary of the Louisiana Fire Prevention Bureau for many years, will become active manager of the Peter F. Pescud General Insurance Agency October 1. He will succeed Robert F. Gottschalk, who has been with the agency for thirty years.

Judge Felix S. Hingle, one of the best known residents of the lower parishes, and who presided over the District Court which includes Plaquemines and St. Bernard parishes, died suddenly at 7:15 o'clock Friday night at his residence, 4200 Burgundy street, where he had made his home for the last few years. He had been in poor health for some time, but his death was unexpected. Judge Hingle was 61 years of age, and was a noted figure in the politics of the lower parishes for many years.

All the 40 per cent of the white men certified in the first draft will leave New Orleans next Wednesday for Fort Pike, Arkansas, under orders issued by the provost marshal general Friday. This caused the local boards to get busy Friday in issuing notices to certified men. The red cards were placed in the mails Friday, but failure to receive a card does not eliminate a man from the charge of desertion if he fails to report at the time specified.

Conquest of the brain, superinduced by a fall at her home, 637 Bourbon street, fifteen days ago, caused the death at 11:15 o'clock Friday night of Mme. Antoine Alcatoire, long time resident of New Orleans, and widow of Antoine Alcatoire, who founded Antoine's Restaurant 717 St. Louis street, many years ago. The restaurant opened by his father still is operated by Jules Alcatoire. Mme. Alcatoire, who was 85 years of age, was one of the most remarkable women in New Orleans. Up to the day of the accident that caused the fatal illness she was hale and hearty, and only last month celebrated her birthday anniversary at her home with her five surviving sons and a daughter, twenty-one grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

John Fitzpatrick and others applied to the Civil District Court Friday for an injunction to prevent the board of school directors and the city of New Orleans from carrying into effect the resolution adopted by the school board in respect to discontinuing the use of the Fisk School for the education of negro children and from discontinuing McDonough No. 43 as a school for education of children of the white race, and from substituting McDonough No. 13 for Fisk School for the education of negro children.

Though the last battalion of the First Louisiana Regiment left Camp Nicholls for Camp Beauregard, Alexandria, Friday night, the time for Washington Artillery to go is not yet known here. Camp Nicholls has lost more than half of its military population in the last ten days through the First Regiment and the Louisiana Field Hospital Corps, leaving Washington Artillery and

the Second Separate Troop of Cavalry the only commands remaining. The cavalry is expecting orders momentarily to entrain for Camp McClellan, Anniston, Ala.

There are quite a few boat owners who do not seem to realize the importance of securing a "license to navigate" for their boats, although they have been repeatedly advised by the Navy Department to do so. This license is as important as any license issued by any other Department of the Government, and if boat owners would stop to think that the absence of this license from their boats will be sufficient for patrol boats to tie them up which would put them to a lot of trouble and inconvenience, they would not waste any time in applying for same.

J. B. Muzin, president, and William R. Fayard, secretary, both business representatives of the Brotherhood of Painters and Decorators' Union, Local No. 166, say the painters and paperhangers of this city were called out Friday evening at 8 o'clock, and will hold a meeting to discuss the new wage agreement which has been before them for six weeks. This is a demand for higher wages, closed shop, and a Saturday afternoon holiday.

The total actual state valuation as by the Board of State Affairs, is about \$1,041,202,586; and, as the board has determined on 50 per cent of the actual valuation as assessed valuation, the assessed value of all Louisiana property and holdings now is approximately \$520,601,293. These figures indicate an increased assessment for the state of some \$101,863,611.

There are said to be about fifteen thousand head of well bred Texas cattle involved in deals to bring live stock to Louisiana and the majority of the deals are closed.

After checking up stock, furniture and damage to the building it was found that the fire which originated in the Ibernia Bank Building, at Carondelet and Gravier streets, shortly before midnight Wednesday, had caused a damage of approximately \$100,000. The building was valued at \$1,000,000 and is insured for \$800,000.

The government requires 10,000 negro stavedores for work in France. New Orleans is expected to raise 1000 of these. Negroes are paid \$33 per month and all clothing, food, medical expenses and transportation. Lieutenant Colonel Thomas J. Lewis, 337 St. Charles street, has charge of the recruiting for this branch of the service.
