CITY AND STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

Four members of the police force, including Sergeant John M. Dunn, who were dismissed from the service a week ago, on charges of neglect of duty, for failing to locate a lottery shop in the Twelfth Precinct, were restored to duty by Superintendent of Police Mooney at police trials Tuesday morning. Sergeant Dunn was put in command of the First Precinct.

Arthur Ramaquera, automobile driver, 22 years old, 3222 Burgundy street, was stabbed in the neck, just an inch below the windpipe, and Charles Bronson, of Bogalusa, La., was cut on the hand, late Tuesday night at Canal and Franklin streets, after argument regarding the price of a ride to the Union Station. Neither was seriously hurt.

A mistrial was entered in the case of The State vs. H. M. Lee, merchant at Oak who was charged with having killed his brother-in-law, Percy Dennis, in his (Lee's) store on the night of May 28, by shooting him in the neck with a pistol. The jury, after being out for twelve hours, stood nine for acquittal and three for conviction. Lee was released on a \$5,000 bond.

The entertainment given at the Catholic Army Club, Camp Nicholls, last Monday night was a signal success, and was highly enjoyed by the soldiers and their friends who were in attendance in large numbers. The program was directed by Mrs. Philip Schoen and Mr. Charles Ganachau, whose talents are much appreciated.

Announcement of the confirmation of Joseph P. Henican as representative of the Export Administrative Board in New Orleans was made by Special Representative Bullock following receipt of a telegram from Washington saying the name of Mr. Henican had been approved by the President.

Robert F. Broussard, junior United States senator from Louisiana, has wired Governor Pleasant from Washington calling upon him as the official in Louisiana who is responsible for the appointment of this board, to join with him in a request to the secretary of war for the immediate removal of the district exemption board for the Western District of Louisiana.

Robert F. Broussard charges that this board has "refused to recognize, in a great number of cases, the regulations fixed under the army select draft bill, exempting from service men with dependents who are without other means of support," and says "the conditions as to those cases are intolerable."

Reason of the Dog Watch. The "dog watch" on board ship is two half hour watches between 4 and 6 and 6 and 8 in the evening of the maritime day. The day is thus divided into seven watches instead of six, as the latter number would give the more arduous time of duty continuously to one section of the crew. By the device of the dog watch the duty is divided equally in the course of every two days.

Preparations for the big campaign to sell the second Liberty Loan bonds are being perfected in New Orleans. The local committee met with the federal reserve bank officials on the return of Marcus Walker, managing director, from Atlanta Wednesday. The organization of committees to handle the bonds throughout the district included in this branch of the federal reserve bank was started. Bonds will be handled for the surrounding territory at Alexandria, Lake Charles, Crowley, Opelousas, Lafayette, New Iberia, Franklin, Thibodaux, Donaldsonville, Baton Rouge, Hammond and Bogalusa.

That dependent grandparents are included in the regulation exempting persons claiming exemption on the ground of dependency, was the announcement made by Dr. Miller, chairman of District Exemption Board No. 1, at the regular session Wednesday morning. The question was discussed a few days ago in an appeal wherein the claimant declared he was the only support of an infirm grandmother.

John M. Parker, food administrator for Louisiana, Wednesday gave out the names of Samuel B. Hicks of Shreveport, T. B. Gilbert of Winnboro and H. N. Pharr of Orléans as additions to the executive committee in charge of the card campaign for food conservation. M. L. Alexander, president of the Conservation Commission, will serve ex-officio.
