CITY AND STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

Another link in the chain of commerce between New Orleans and Latin-America has been established by the leasing of a warehouse, 539 Magazine street, by Humberto Martinez, who represents a group of Nicaraguan planters and it is understood a company with \$100,000 or \$500,000 capital will be incorporated in the state to handle large shipments of coffee, tropical fruits and other products.

Campaign to raise \$25,000 for the upbuilding and maintenance of the Boy Scouts in New Orleans was launched formally Monday afternoon when George H. Terriberry called his committee together to discuss preparations to the drive which started Tuesday morning.

Sunday, November 18, will be "home day" for the boys who are going "over there" in New Orleans. On that date each family will be expected to take care of one of the boys. All they will have to do is give him food and a good time.

Captain Paul D. Bunker, of the quartermaster's corps, has been promoted to the rank of major, and it is understood, will remain in charge of the quartermaster's department here as a result of his promotion. Major Bunker was in the coast artillery prior to his transfer here. Since coming here he has purchased more than \$5,000,000 worth of cantonment supplies.

Charged with having counterfeited money, Phillip Oster, said to be the oldest counterfeiter in the United States, was given a hearing before United States Commissioner Browne Tuesday. The accused was committed to the parish prison in default of bond in the sum of \$3,000. Oster was arrested by Special Agent Looby at St. Philip and Bourbon streets, a few days ago, and a subsequent search of his premises revealed the apparatus.

Lives of 15 boys five to seven years old were saved by the quick action and presence of mind by the Sisters of St. Aphonsus Asylum, of 2000 Fourth street, Tuesday night when one of the dormitories at the institution caught fire. The boys were led from the burning room by the sisters before the flames had gained headway. The fire started in a lot of paper in a piano box at the rear of the asylum.

supporting. The Louisiana Commission for the Blind is planning a large workshop, wherein employment will be given to the New Orleans blind men and women. Part of the fund to be collected Sunday, November 11 in the churches will be used.

Joseph P. Gleens, one of the founders of the town of Gleens, in Lafourche parish and a sugar planter, died in his home, 1123 Jackson avenue, Tuesday night. He was 87 years old. He came to the city 35 years ago from Louisville and bought much land in Lafourche parish. Seven years ago he retired from active management of his plantations. He was married to Miss Mary McHallen. Funeral arrangements will be announced after the arrival from Louisville of Charles P. Gleens.

Two false fire alarms in Bienville street kept the police and fire department busy about 1 a. m., Wednesday. Four men were locked up in the third precinct police station charged with turning in false alarms.

Commissioner Stone introduced an ordinance into the council Tuesday to provide for the registration of all chauffeurs and requiring each to wear a badge. The ordinance applies to all drivers of vehicles for hire, and to chauffeurs employed by private persons, but not owners driving their own cars unless the cars are for hire for public use. An exception is made in favor of chauffeurs of federal, state and city officials and of army and navy officers. The ordinance provides that every chauffeur must have a certificate. On the back of this certificate will be printed a copy of the ordinance. He will be required also to have a badge, and this badge must be of the same color as the license plate, and must be renewed each year.

On order from Washington there have been shipped from the mint to New Orleans \$100,000 in quarters, nickels, dimes and pennies. Dozens for pennies in the South is the way above normal as a result of the war taxes, say Washington advices.

J. P. Simmons, a former Canal street piano dealer, who has figured in the news columns at frequent intervals, is again in the limelight. He was arrested Tuesday night and locked up in the First Precinct station. This time the wife he married about nine months ago is his accuser. She told the police her husband abused her and threatened her life with a revolver.

Mississippi National Guardsmen are on route to Alexandria, La., and by the end of this week, all the units that have been at Camp Jackson, with the exception of about 500 men in detention camp, will be at work at Camp Beauregard.
