CITY WORKHOUSE.

It is certainly a violation of justice to make a man pay for his debt, as it is to keep the offender from work. About four hundred prisoners are now supported by the tax on their daily sustenance. Their labor would be available to the workhouse. It is evident that human and economic should be strengthened.
